This week's safer internet tip:


Discuss what to do if something upsetting or worrying happens






Meanwhile, Year 5s learnt the practicalities of the Three Little Pigs story, by 'blowing that house down' (with Mrs Horner's leaf blower!)






Maple Class

We would like to thank the teachers who took us and you for reading all of this!



Recruitment of a member of the Audit and Risk Committee

RLT Trust Board

We are a multi-academy trust responsible for 29 schools in Oxfordshire and Swindon and a school centred initial teacher training provider. We are looking for a new member of the Audit and Risk Committee of our Trust Board and inviting applications from anyone who would like to join the three other external members of the committee.

This committee provides assurances to the Trust Board that both financial and non-financial risks are being adequately identified and managed by reviewing and agreeing a programme of work to address, and provide assurance on, controls put in place to mitigate those risks. The role of the Audit Committee is therefore to ask <u>what</u> is being done about a particular risk, <u>when</u> a change in the status of the risk can be expected and to monitor the successful delivery of this improvement.

The committee meets three times a year as a full committee plus an annual meeting of external members only for self-scrutiny and reflection. The meetings are generally held online.

We are looking for someone with finance and audit experience but not necessarily in an educational setting. Applications from members of ethnic minority communities are particularly welcome.




