Talk with your child about responsible use of their phone

They have also seen some tadpoles!






MAPLE CLASS

CNPS Year 4 Modern Foreign Languages Festival

A report from Nate and Toby

At Chipping Norton School, we were learning about three different languages: Dutch, German and French. We were put in groups which were names of countries including Holland, Portugal and France and many more. We did lots of different activities including:

Dutch words bingo with a white board. You had all the words we learnt before such as: hallo -hello, doei - bye, alsjeblieft -please and Ik heet -my name is, just as a few examples. But there was a twist... You could only cross off the words at the top or the bottom of the list.

In German class we learnt some colours and did a competition on who could slap the colour on the board with a plastic hand first. Whoever hit it first would gain a point, first to three points won. Just some of the colours were: rot -red blau -blue schwarz -black lila -purple and rosa -pink. It was fun, but you had to be quicker than the other person.

In the French class we learnt how to say 'My monster has lots of' e.g têtes -heads cornes -horns yeux -eyes tenticules -tentacles and ailes -wings. We also played a game called splat, a bit like the German game but with monsters' body parts.

After that, we tried different French cheeses such as: brie, roquefort and Emmental. Some were strong in flavour, some were chewy, some tasted like cheese we already know.

When arrived we were all a bit confused, but in the end we learnt lots of different words and had fun. In conclusion, it was worth it and we all had an unforgettable time.









OAK CLASS

A report from Roxie and Gwennie on last week's visit to Soldiers of Oxfordshire Museum

The moment we hopped off the bus, we knew we were in for a treat. We stepped into the museum and were surrounded by army uniforms, huge cannons, and a fistful of fun.

We played a game of guess the timeline: your groups each had a timeline and pieces of paper with photos on. You had to guess the right time for the picture. Then we sat on the floor around a small cabinet full of old books and toys. We had to guess just by looking at them which were replicas and which were real artefacts. We learnt about a bell that was rung in small villages to warn them that bombing planes were coming, and our school bell is the same artefact that we use to signal it is the end of lunch or break!!!

We were split into two groups. One went to see the Anderson shelter and go in it while the others looked at and touched things people used in the war. Inside the Anderson shelter there were four beds, two on the floor, two on top. There were books and games for the children to play with and lanterns and pillows, since sometimes bombings could last days. It was at least 3 metres wide and 4 metres high. In the area you could touch things: there was a chamber pot, book and games, a whistle, a safety helmet, a water pump, an identity book and a stuffed teddy bear.

As we departed from the museum, we made one last stop at the dress up area, where we could dress up as army cadets, and went in a replica of a spitfire (a plane used in WW2). We had a fantastic time at the museum and would recommend it for schools or even a nice day out. We had a great time and can't wait to go back.






