Head's News

Attendance

95.5% (below National)

Unfortunately, this is the lowest attendance percentage that we have had for quite a while. I am aware that a number of children have been unwell recently but we still have a number of families taking holiday during term time; which has a huge impact on a child's education. *Currently 30% of our absence is due to holiday, 50% is due to illness and 14% for medical appointments.*

Reminders about attendance

- The school day begins at 8.40am
- The registers are taken at 8.50am
- Parents need to contact the school office each day if their child is going to be absent and give a reason for the absence
- If a child's attendance falls below 97% the class teacher will be in contact to offer support
- If a child's attendance falls below 95% the headteacher will be in contact to offer support
- If attendance is persistent (below 90%) parents will be invited in to discuss the situation
- If attendance continues to decline a referral to the Local Authority will be made
- No term time holiday will be authorised
- Only exceptional circumstances warrant a leave of absence. The school considers each application
 individually, taking into account the specific facts and circumstances and relevant background context
 behind the request. If a leave of absence is granted, which must be requested in writing, it is for the
 headteacher to determine the length of the time the pupil can be away from school. As head teachers
 should only grant leaves of absence in exceptional circumstances.
- At Middle Barton School, 'exceptional circumstances' will be interpreted as events that are "rare, significant, unavoidable and short" for the individual pupil, which outweigh the loss of teaching time (as determined by the headteacher). With the term 'unavoidable' meaning an event that could not reasonably be scheduled at another time
